Traits of a Good KofC Leader By Bob Kish, Regional Growth Dir

Vision: A leader with "vision" has a clear, vivid picture of where to go, as well as a firm grasp on what success

looks like and how to achieve it. But it's not enough to have a vision; leaders must also share it and act upon it. A leader must be able to communicate his vision in terms that cause followers to buy into it. He must communicate

clearly and passionately, as passion is contagious. A good leader must have the discipline to work toward the vision single-mindedly, as well as to direct his actions and those of the team toward the goal.

Action: Action is the mark of a leader. A leader does not suffer laziness but is always doing something in pursuit of the vision, inspiring others to do the same.

Integrity: Integrity is the combination of outward actions and inner values. Such an individual can be trusted because he never veers from inner values, even when it might be the easy thing to do so. As a Knight and Catholic Gentlemen, I would hope "integrity" oozes from all of us. Honest dealings, predictable reactions, well-controlled emotions, and an absence of tantrums and harsh outbursts are all signs of integrity. A leader who is centered in integrity will be more approachable by his followers.

Dedication: This means spending whatever time or energy is necessary to accomplish the task at hand. A leader inspires dedication by example, doing whatever it takes to complete the next step toward the vision. By setting an excellent example, leaders can show followers that if we all work hard we will achieve something great.

Magnanimity: This means giving credit where it is due. This leader ensures that credit for successes is spread as widely as possible throughout his Council, District or State. Conversely, a good leader also takes personal responsibility for failures. This sort of reverse magnanimity helps other people feel good about themselves and draws the team closer together. To spread the fame and take the blame is a hallmark of effective leadership.

Humility: Leaders with humility recognize that they are no better or worse than other members of the team. A humble leader is not boastful or puts himself on a pedestal but rather tries to elevate everyone else. Leaders with humility also understand that their status does not make them the ultimate, all knowing supreme super Knight.

Openness: Openness means being able to listen to new ideas, even if they do not conform to the usual way of thinking. Good leaders are able to suspend judgment while listening to others' ideas, as well as accept new ways of doing things that someone else thought of. Openness builds mutual respect and trust between leaders and followers, and it also keeps the team well supplied with new ideas that can further its vision.

Creativity: is the ability to think differently, to get outside of the box that constrains solutions. Creativity gives leaders the ability to see things that others have not seen and thus lead followers in new directions. The most important question that a leader can ask is, "What if ...?"

Possibly, the worst thing a leader can ever say is, "I know this is a dumb question ...?"

Fairness

Fairness means dealing with others consistently and justly. A leader must check all the facts and hear everyone out before passing judgment. He must avoid leaping to conclusions based on incomplete evidence. When people feel they that are being treated fairly, they reward a leader with loyalty and dedication.

Assertiveness: Assertiveness is not the same as aggressiveness. Rather, it is the ability to clearly state what one expects so that there will be no misunderstandings. A leader must be assertive to get the desired results. Along with assertiveness comes the responsibility to clearly understand what followers expect from their leader. It seems that being under assertive or over assertive may be the most common weakness among aspiring leaders.

Sense of Humor: This is vital to relieve tension and boredom, as well as to defuse hostility. Effective leaders know how to use humor to energize followers. Humor is a form of power that provides some control over the work environment. And simply put, humor fosters good fraternalism and ultimately friendships.

As a newer member of the Knights of Columbus Council 9756 here at Our Lady of Peace Catholic Church in Pinedale, Wyoming I am honored to report some of the efforts my council and fellow brothers have done in the last six months.

In November of 2018, nine of our Knights provided ten cords of wood to the family of a fellow Knight who was undergoing radiation and chemotherapy treatments. In March of this year, extreme wind and snow conditions created heavy drifts in a local elderly couples long drive way and one of our Knights plowed them out so they could get to a doctor's appointment. In April, twenty Knights and volunteers vacated the old parish kitchen in our church and moved everything in storage so construction could continue of our new facility. Also in this same month six Knights assisted a person in moving from his home in rural Wyoming to a home here in Pinedale. This person recently had surgery and needed to be closer to our local medical facility. Our Knights also helped a family and another couple move. This same month members of our council spent two days helping our Sister Church St. Anne's in Big Piney, Wyoming remove and install new pews in their church. Just in this month of May 2019 our Knights provided flowers to all of the Mothers who attended mass and also provided a Mother's day Breakfast to the public.

Our financial support has also helped many. We provided a donation of \$14,000 (matched by the National Knights of Columbus, thank you) for a much needed Ultra Sound Machine to the Pregnancy Resource Center here in Pinedale as well as all the donations from our Mother's Day Breakfast totally \$3700. Our support for the Pregnancy Resource Center will continue. The Knights of Columbus Council #9726 has also donated to date \$13,421 to the Parish building fund. This support for this project will be ongoing as we remodel the entire Church, classrooms and kitchen. We have provided financial support to seminarians and have committed to restoring the Church's Bell tower once the remodel of our church is complete and look forward to be sounding the bell of our devotion to God for years to come.

Helping others is our call to service in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ and I am proud to call all of my fellow Knights of Columbus Council 9726 my brothers. God Bless.

July, 2019 Council Meeting Remarks

The Catholic Difference. What does that mean, "Discover the Catholic Difference?" Is it just a marketing slogan or is there real meaning behind it?

Let's look at that at several levels. Our Catholicity as an organization forms all that we do. Our Order was founded on the principles of Charity, Unity and Fraternity; as a Catholic business we also have core values of Integrity, Professionalism, Excellence and Respect. In all our dealings we try to embody those values in the field and at our Supreme Office.

Money from insurance premiums and annuity deposits is managed by our investment department colleagues, Knights of Columbus Asset Advisors. "Monthly Challenge from the Supreme Chaplain"

The Lord said to her in reply, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her." (Gospel for July 21, Lk 10:41-42)

Imagine yourself in Martha's shoes. While your seemingly lazy sister Mary sits at the feet of Jesus, *you* are the one preparing and serving the food, setting the table and making things happen. And then, all of a sudden, Jesus chides *you* and compares you unfavorably to your sister. Jesus' words can strike us as harsh. Wasn't Martha doing a good thing by serving our Lord? Yet if we are honest, we recognize that it's all too easy to get caught up in busyness doing good things and all the while miss the opportunity to encounter Christ. By God's grace, may we hear these tough words from Jesus, resist this tendency to busyness and strive to choose "the better part."

Challenge by Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E. Lori:

This month, I challenge you to spend five extra minutes sitting before the Lord before or after Sunday Mass. Second, I challenge you to participate in the Faith in Action Sacramental Gifts program or pray for those receiving the sacraments, that they might choose "the better part."

Questions for Reflection:

If it were you with Jesus that evening, would you have been more likely to be a "Martha" or a "Mary"? What does it mean to choose "the better part"? How did spending a few extra moments with the Lord before or after Mass affect your encounter with Christ in the Eucharist?


